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Calling all Foster & Adoptive Parents and others involved with fostering and adoption. AFAPA is proud to announce its Annual Foster & Adoptive Parent Training Conference. AFAPA has been presenting this conference annually for more than 30 years. Many changes have taken place over the past few years with attendance continuing to grow. Looking back just a few years ago the attendance in 2000 was just around 100 then in 2001 attendance was up to around 150 which was held in Tuskegee. In 2002 the conference was held in Montgomery at the Guest House Inn with more than 200 attending. We then moved over to the Governors House Inn for 2003 & 2004 where attendance continued to grow to more than 300. In 2005 we moved the conference to Gardendale in Jefferson County and we saw more than 350 attend. Then last year again the conference was held in Montgomery at Frazer Methodist Church and we had our largest crowd ever with

more than 400 people attending. This year we are looking forward to an even larger crowd at Shocco Springs. Shocco is just north of Talladega just off Highway 77. We will have a business meeting this year as we do every 2 years for the purpose of electing new officers for the AFAPA Board. Any foster or adoptive parents who would like to be considered for a position on the AFAPA board should contact a member of the current AFAPA Board for information about submitting their name to the nominating committee. We will have the business meeting on Friday Morning and will follow with 10 hours of training Friday and Saturday. Pat O'Brien will be our opening session speaker. Pat is Founder & Executive Director of "You Gotta Believe" This organization is dedicated to finding permanent homes for teens and pre-teens in the foster care system. Alabama CASA Network, Inc is sponsoring a Diversity training workshop entitled "A World of Inclusion" on Monday, March 5, 2007. The training will be held at the Carraway-Davie House just off I-459 in Birmingham from 9:00 am until 1:30 pm with a 45 minute lunch break. The cost is \$10 and includes lunch and all training materials. Foster parents, CASA/CAJA volunteers and staff and social workers have been approved for 3.75 training hours. The training is designed to develop an awareness of human diversity that focuses on understanding, respecting and valuing that diversity, with the goal of enabling people to communicate effectively and work cooperatively to produce positive outcomes.

Through mini lectures, small group discussions and individual role play, attendees will become more sensitive to ways their personal beliefs, perceptions and behavior affect the comfort, safety and personal freedom of others. We will also examine ways to encourage a spirit of openness and acceptance where cultural differences are acknowledged, respected and valued.

These four boys are the youngest of a sibling group of seven. All seven children are bonded to one another. These four are to be placed together with an adoptive family that will see to it that the boys have continued contact with their three older siblings.

Ronnie, born October 1994 is an intelligent and sensitive child. He is very helpful at home. He enjoys drawing, art and jumping on the trampoline. For school year 06-07 he is in the 6th grade and is on grade level. His grades range from A's to C's.

Simon, born June 1997, is a quiet and unassuming child. He likes to watch cartoons and play the game, "Connect Four". For school year 06-07 he is in the four grade and he needs help in reading, math and language. He works on a computer in his classroom to help him improve his math skills. He likes to volunteer as a class helper for his teacher.

Spencer, born May 2000, is described as an outgoing little boy who easily meets new people. He is in the first grade (school year 06-07) and he needs extra services to help him be educationally successful. He receives this extra help in a self-contained Special Ed classroom at school. He is reading well and is a quick auditory learner. He plays well alone, but needs help interacting with others.

Rodney, born June 2001, likes to play with cars and toy motorcycles. He has lots of energy and needs parents and teachers that can help direct that energy into productive time. He is in Kindergarten (06-07 school year) and needs additional help with his class work.




male role model for him, particularly in demonstrating how women are treated and respected.

Items of Interest

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN ADOPTION THROUGH STATE DHR?

County DHR offices may approve families to adopt, only if the family is going to adopt a foster child placed in their home by their county department.

If you have applied to be an adoptive parent and have completed GPS and the home study process, the Office of Adoption can verify that you have an adoption home study on file with the State DHR office. Having a study on file with our office is the only way that you are considered as a possible resource for any/all of Alabama's waiting children. If you want to verify your approval status, you can e-mail Families4ALKids@dhr.state.al.us. Give us your name and birth date (for both parents if a two-parent household) and your county of residence and the name of your county resource worker. If you don't have access to e-mail (preferred method of contact) you may call and leave this information on the Recruitment hotline at 1-866-425-5437 (1-866-4AL-KIDS).
