Vote Yes September 18th Stand up for the Children!!!

Together We Can!! Make a Difference in the lives of children

A rejection at the polls of a proposal to divert money from a state trust fund to the General Fund would have an adverse affect on the children of this state in many ways.

Voters will decide Sept. 18 whether to transfer \$145 million a year for three years from the Alabama Trust Fund, which holds offshore drilling royalties, to the General Fund, where it can be used to pay for state programs. The \$1.6 billion General Fund budget for next year was written under the assumption the referendum will pass, so if it fails many government agencies would face major budget cuts. Across-the-board cuts of nearly 12 percent could be ordered to make up the shortfall. Alabama Department of Human Resources could see double digit cuts in services and programs. It could be devastating to foster care programs including board payments for foster care which have not seen a raise of any significance in 10 years.

Medicaid would also be one of the programs hit hard if the referendum fails to pass. The program covers care for about 900,000 people in Alabama.

Please go to the polls and vote yes don't assume it will pass. You have to get out and vote on September 18th!!!!!

needs reminders about requirements for his special needs, she is loyal and protective of him.

Alexis has endured much in her young life. She has a difficult time with trusting people and will continue to need ongoing skilled therapy as well as medication management for her diagnoses and difficult behavior at this time. Alexis needs to know and experience a family that will be there for her on a permanent basis no matter what. She craves and requires much individual attention by a caretaker, and jealousy or feelings of rejection can be an issue for her without it. Positive attachment to a new family, utmost tolerance and patience by someone who will stick with her through any challenge would be essential keys to a successful placement.

TEENS NEED FOREVER FAMILIES TOO...

I have the chance to meet a lot of teenagers who have been adopted and lots who are waiting to be adopted. One young lady I met at the NACAC conference a few years ago had just turned 18 and she had just been adopted. It is always such a blessing to talk to these young adults and hear what they have to say about foster care and adoption and how they feel about the whole system of Child Welfare. I'm always left with a thought of why? Why has not someone made a connection with this child that would lead to a forever home for them and why does it take so long. When you stop to consider a 16 year old who has been in care 4 years has spent 25% of their life in foster care. In this case it may have been even more. I would like to share just a short note that Jessmynda sent me recently. "It is very uplifting to see people like you and your wife, and so many other wonderful people at NACAC working so hard to not only find homes for children, but taking the time to educate people about what we really need. Over time, I have come to the conclusion that the beauty of mine and so many adopted children's lives is that we have

experienced the worst of the world, not because the world is terrible, but because God cared enough to help us see the beauty of something that people take for granted every day: a **family**. I have 100% faith in the fact that He never gives us more than we can bear. And every adopted child, is blessed with a knowledge and understanding of the world that too many people don't ever have the chance to get".

For those children who have not found that forever home. Many youth 14 and over may not be found by a family. For them there is some help available through the Independent Living Program (ILP).

She receives minimal outside assistance and test taking is her biggest challenge.

Brittany is the youngest and is also a bright, fun girl who has a lot of energy as well. She loves swimming, art, gymnastics, and horses. She is an animal lover and would be fine with any family pets. Christmas is her favorite holiday because it is the birthday of Jesus and also because she gets presents! Her favorite food is a burger and fries! She aspires to be a masseuse when she grows up and is described as a "girly girl". She says she is a country girl, loves country music, mud riding and the quiet.

Both of these girls attend church and enjoy it. They desire to continue church attendance upon adoption and hope to have a two parent family or a single mother with no other children in the home. This request is made by the children specifically, and not due to behavior. They currently live in a group setting and want desperately to be in a calm atmosphere where they are the only children. They want a forever home and with proper guidance will flourish into lovely women. They are a joy to be around, friendly, interactive and open to change.

MEET JESSE & CAMERON

The sibling group being recruited for includes two bothers. Jesse born April 1998 and Cameron, born April 1999. They have a sister who was recently placed



for adoption in our state. Therefore, we are particularly interested in finding permanent family for Jesse and Cameron in Alabama.
